# Community Service Committee

The Directors of two of the local Bucks County Pantries we support, The Emergency Relief Association and the Salvation Army of Levittown, called me to let me know that they were very low on pet food, close to only about 10 pounds each for dog and cat food. I contacted

Chewy on January 10th and ordered about 250 pounds of pet food to be delivered to each pantry. Chewy's Customer Support manager also arranged for additional discounts on the invoice as he understood the orders were going to food pantries. The third pantry we support (FSABC) told me that they were well stocked with pet food at about 155 pounds of each for dogs and cats. ERA and SA received their shipments from Chewy within 3 days of LBDTC order being placed. This will help their members keep their pets fed and comfortable for the coming winter months. Invoice totals will be deducted from the cash donations made at LBDTC's November 9, 2024 Pet Food Drive at ShopRite in Fairless Hills.

Through the years Diane encouraged me to go to other trainers, but Diane was always my go to when I had issues.

We shared funny episodes while serving on the board of LBDTC.

When we first got the training site Diane and I rented a floor scrubber from Home Depot. We took my puppy Joy with us and then proceeded to go to the training site. Joy was in a puppy crate sitting on top of the window shelf. While trying to use the scrubber we realized it was bigger than both of us. I offered to go back to my house and get scrubbers and vacuums and things easier to use. Diane said leave the puppy with me .When I got back, Diane was full of gray muck. She had tried to use the floor scubber while I was gone and she slipped and fell on the floor. Stories like that were part of our relationship. I could go on and on, but they're my stories and I will keep them close to my heart.



When I first started tracking, Diane and I trained together. We used to drive to the Poconos for our lessons and had lots to say on the way up, not to mention a good lunch on the way home. When Clancy, Diane's tracking dog could no longer track due to an injury, Diane continued to track with me. She laid many tracks for us at Tyler and Core Creek Park to help prepare us for an upcoming test, and she came to the test to cheer for us when we passed.

Diane introduced me to Lower Bucks. She had me stewarding even before I became a member. She introduced me to Terri and Tammy at Up Front Farm and they, too, had a big influence on our Obedience and Rally years. When I was recovering from a concussion from a hard hit to my head, Diane drove me to my lessons at Up Front until I was ready to drive again. Her motto was always, "How can I help you?"
